Bir Raghab Moran

In the annals of medieval Assam history, among all the notable personalities, the name of Bir Raghab Moran is always remembered for his courage, bravery, leadership, and sacrifices for the sake of the Assamese proletariats. He played a very significant role in the Moamaria Rebellion during the reign of Swargadeo Laksmi Singha which was a spontaneous outburst of simmering discontentment against the exploitative nature of the Ahom regime. In various circumstances, Raghab Moran alias Raghab Neog himself faced a number of discriminations and hardships from the authoritarian Ahom administration. Kirtichandra Barbarua's physical torture and assault not only made him angry but also the entire Moamaria sect was thereby insulted. Besides, the religious policies adopted by the contemporary Ahom rulers posed a great challenge to the Moamarias. It made the entire Moamaria sect discontent and there grew a sense of hatred and dissension against the Ahom rule.

In this regard, Raghab Neog along with his friends and followers, remaining at the forefront organized and united the Moamarias against the mighty Ahom rulers to take revenge with a view to establish the Moamarias in a legitimate position in the feudal Ahom society. Subsequently, the Ahom rulers were bound to bow down to them which ultimately gave birth to the Muttock Kingdom. From this point of view, Bir Raghab Moran who used to be a popular leader from the Moran Community among the Moamarias, is still a hero not only in the minds of the Moran community and Vaishnavite Moamaria sect but also among all those who are looked down upon as downtrodden and ignorant in the entire Assamese Society. He remains in the hearts and minds of Assamese people as one the most remarkable cultural and historic luminaries of Assamese socio-cultural life.

COLLEGE PROFILE

Bir Raghab Moran Government Model College, Doomdooma was established by the Government of Assam on 7th March,2O2O. With the central aim of improving access, quality and fostering equity in the higher education scenario of Assam, Government of Assam, in consonance with the centrally sponsored scheme of Model Degree Colleges, set about this enterprising journey of creation of educational institutions catering to higher education needs. On the basis of nationwide survey of Gross Enrollment Ratio (GER) or Gross Enrollment Index (GEI), educationally backward districts or EBDs have been identified which share the characteristic feature of having GER lower than the national average. 12 EBDs have been identified in Assam, out of which Tinsukia is one of them. Our college is a successful manifestation of this spirited initiative of Government of Assam. In the more local context, our college has been able to assuage the severely disproportionate student to higher education institution ratio existing in the Doomdooma region.



It is noteworthy that the name of the college, "Bir Raghab Moran Government Model College" holds immense cultural and historical significance for the inhabitants of this region and Assam, at large. In a way, the college implicitly carries forward the glory and immortalizes Bir Raghab Moran, the historic pride and son of the soil of the Moran community and a notable cultural figure and historical luminary of the Assamese socio-cultural life.

The cultural and demographic landscape in which the college is situated in has deeply helped in shaping our vision, mission and ideals. Culturally, the area comprises of a rich intermix of cultures and ethnicities. This inspires the foremost ideal of the college to be inclusive in every sense and uphold by heart and soul, the idea of 'unity in diversity'. It also serves the college an opportunity to hone and showcase the cultural resources and knowledge the students here can offer. A dominant component of the industrial landscape here is the tea sector. Besides, an inclination towards entrepreneurship among students is readily observed. Under such circumstances, the college has a topmost priority of providing a facilitative platform aiming at inculcating the right scientific and technical knowhow and skill-based training to the youth, so that they can materialize their dreams.

Even though, the principal rationale of our college when established was to rectify the disproportionate student to higher education institution ratio existing in the Doomdooma region. Notwithstanding the fact that the college had been recently established, it is a matter of great pride and contentment that regular official classes for UG 1st Semester course in the college successfully began from 21st December, 2020 with an overwhelming student enrolment rate. Although the classes are currently being held in a temporary structural arrangement provided by Government of Assam in the Doomdooma College premises, the permanent campus and building will be ready in near future as the Government of Assam is ramping up efforts for the same. The planned permanent infrastructure and the sprawling campus would comprise of the entire range of amenities required for our college to become an educational institution of excellence starting from spacious and educational technology laden classrooms and library facilities to expansive playgrounds for co-curricular and recreational activities.



Bir Raghab Moran Government Model College has made its humble beginnings with a Three-year Degree Programme (Honours) in Arts under CBCS, Dibrugarh University and a Three-year Degree Programme (Non-Honours) in Arts under CBCS, Dibrugarh University. A few months into our academic journey, the dreaded Corona virus hit again, this time in the form of a second wave, but we have been resilient and strong. Despite being in a formative state, we have made successful arrangements for virtual classes. - Students will be offered Honours Subjects on the basis of Merit and/or Test conducted by respective department.
- General Electives for a specific core course shall be opted by students in terms of preferences (1st, 2nd and 3rd). If seats for the General Elective in the department of the first preference of student is filled up, then the student shall opt for the 2nd, then 3rd preference in that order.
- Students from Science and Commerce stream can also join in any of the honours programme.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Two copies of recent passport size photograph
- Self-attested copies of
 - o Age proof Certificate (HSLC Admit/Certificate)
 - o Marks-sheets of HSLC and HSSLC
 - o Passing Certificates of HSLC and HSSLC
 - o Caste Certificate from the competent authority wherever necessary
 - o Certificate on Differently Able Person (if applicable)
 - o Documents in support of Extra-Curricular Activities (if any)
- Character Certificate from the Head of the institution last attended.
- Original Income certificate of parents from the competent authority.
- Gap Period Certificate wherever applicable. (An applicant passing the qualifying examination earlier than the current year will have to submit a gap period certificate from the Head of the institution last attended or Officer-in-Charge of the nearest Police station or Government Gazetted Officer testifying his/her activities during the interim period. If the gap period of study is more than 3(three) years he/she will not be eligible for admission.)

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

- Admission into the First Year Degree Course are allowed after the announcement of result by the AHSEC or other recognized Councils or Boards.
- The Admission Process will be conducted in online mode, the particulars of which will be duly notified well ahead as per the directions and procedures provided by Government of Assam.
- Admission fee/ payments related formalities as and when required would be determined as per latest Government of Assam directives.

Guidelines

- Students have to keep ready with them, the scanned copy of Photograph, Signature, Pass Certificate, Mark-sheet, Caste Certificate, income certificate of parents (if any) etc. before filling up the online application form.
- Interested candidates must register and obtain a Unique ID through the web portal of Directorate of Higher Education (DHE) (http://dheonlineadmission.amtron.in/sp/)
- Students should possess one Active Mobile Number (WhatsApp enabled), a valid email-ID and a bank account for smooth conduct of admissions

RESERVATION OF SEATS

There is a provision for reservation of seats, as per Government of Assam rules/Dibrugarh University Rules for the candidates belonging to the State of Assam.



GENERAL INFORMATION TO STUDENTS

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in Undergraduate Courses under Dibrugarh University

(Notification DU/DR-A/6-1/19/412 dated 02.05.2019). (With effect from Academic Session 2019-20)

The Course Structure of the Academic Programmes under the CBCS shall be as per the Course Structure given in Annexure I (Dibrugarh University CBCS Regulations)

Core Courses: Compulsory components of an Academic Programme. These Courses are to be compulsorily studied as a core requirement for the programme. The contents of the Core Courses shall be as per the UGC Model Curriculum for the subject/ discipline concerned. However, the Boards of Studies concerned may recommend maximum of 20% deviation from the UGC Model Syllabi wherever requires.

In case, UGC does not provide model Syllabi/ Curriculum, the Board of Studies shall propose their own Core Courses keeping parity of total numbers of credits/ courses with other similar subjects/ disciplines.

Elective Courses: Elective courses shall be chosen by each student from a pool of courses. These courses may be intra-departmental, i.e. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) as well as inter-departmental, i.e., Generic Elective (GE). The students shall have to choose minimum number of DSE and GE in every semester as prescribed in the Course Structure. These courses shall be:

- (i) supportive to the discipline of study
- (ii) providing an expanded scope
- (iii) enabling an exposure to some other discipline/ domain
- (iv) nurturing student proficiency/skill

There shall be a basket of at least eight Elective Courses having equal number of credits. For the students of the same discipline/ subjects these elective courses shall be intra-disciplinary and shall be called DSE Courses. If the students of other discipline/ subjects (within the Programme) opt these electives shall be considered as inter-disciplinary and shall be called GE courses.

Further, there may be few courses conducted under the UGC's Programmes on Massive Open Online Course (MOOC)s. The University may time to time fix the criteria for MOOCs as per the relevant UGC Guidelines on digital education.

Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC): The Ability Enhancement Courses shall be of two kinds- 'Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses' and 'Skill Enhancement Courses'. These courses shall be inter-disciplinary (within the Programme) in nature. 'AEC' Courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement.

Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC):(a) Environmental Science (2 Credit), (b) Communicative English (2 Credit) and (c) Alternative English/Communicative Hindi / MIL (2 Credit). For BA and B.Com Programmes, there shall be a Multi-disciplinary Course of 4 Credits.

Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): (minimum 4 credits): These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge and should contain both theory and lab/hands- on/training/fieldwork. The main purpose of these courses is to provide students life-skills in hands-on mode so as to increase their employability. The list provided under this category are suggestive in nature and each University has complete freedom to suggest their own papers under this category based on their expertise, specialization, requirements, scope and need.

Examination and Evaluation:

- (a) Examination and evaluation shall be done on a continuous basis, at least three times during each semester.
- (b) There shall be 20% marks for internal assessment and 80% marks for End-semester examination in each course during every semester.
- (c) There shall be no provision for re-evaluation of the answer-scripts of the end-semester examinations. However, a candidate may apply for re-scrutiny.
- (d) Internal Assessment:
- (i) In internal assessment, different tools such as objective tests, written tests, assignments, paper presentation, laboratory work, etc. suitable to the courses may be employed. The Procedure for Internal Assessment is prescribed in Annexure III.
- (ii) The students shall be informed in advance about the nature of assessment. Students shall be required to compulsorily attend internal assessment including appearing the Sessional Tests, failing which they will not be allowed to appear for the End-semester examination. A Student cannot repeat In-semester examinations. The department may arrange special in-semester examination whenever necessary.

Rules for Internal Assessment in B.A./B.Sc./ B.Com. Programmes in Semester System

- 1. The marks allotted for Internal Assessment (20%) in each course shall be based on the following:
- a) Sessional Examination I (Written): 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
- b) Sessional Examination II (Written): 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
- c) Seminar/ Group Discussion: 25 % of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
- d) Attendance: 25 % of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
- Leach sessional examination shall be conducted by the concerned teacher(s) of the course. The setting of question paper, invigilation duty, evaluation of answer scripts for each paper shall be done by the concerned teacher(s) as a part of his/her/their normal duty. The teacher concerned shall fix the date of the sessional examination of each course complying with the Academic Calendar of the University.
- In the students shall have to write the answers in the scripts provided and duly authenticated by the college/institute concerned.
- 4. After evaluation, the answer scripts should be shown to the students and corrections should be made if necessary. After this, the answer scripts should be collected back from the students.
- 5. There shall be no provision for "repeat" / "betterment" in the sessional examination. If a student misses any sessional examination for unavoidable reasons, the concerned teacher may allow the student to appear in a separate examination at his/her own discretion.
- The marks of internal assessment secured by a candidate shall be carried over to next legitimate chances.

- 7. If a course is taught by more than one teacher then the concerned teachers shall conduct the process of internal assessment together.
- If any student fails to appear in internal assessment, he/she shall not be eligible to appear in the end semester examinations of the course(s) concerned. The colleges/ institutes shall notify the same prior to filling up forms for examinations.
- 9. At the end of the semester (before the end-semester examinations begin) the concerned College shall submit the internal assessment marks in proper format to the University.
- 1. The University may call the answer scripts from the colleges/ institute at any time during the academic sessions.

(e) End Semester Examination:

- (i) There shall be one End semester examination carrying 80% Marks in each course of a Semester covering the entire syllabus prescribed for the Course. The End semester examination is normally a written/laboratory-based examination/Project Work/Dissertation.
- (ii) The Controller of Examinations shall make necessary arrangements for notifying the dates of the End semester examinations and other procedures as per Dibrugarh University Rules (at least 20 days in advance) and the Academic Calendar notified by the University.

Normally, the End-semester examination for each course shall be of three hour duration.

Students' code of conduct

- It is obligatory for all students to wear the prescribed college uniform.
- All forms of ragging in college campus are strictly prohibited. Strong disciplinary action will be taken against those involving in these activities.
- All powers of maintenance of discipline are vested with the Head of the Institution and his decision shall be final in such matters.
- Students must carry their college identity cards at all times inside the college campus. In case of its loss or damage, the college authority should be informed immediately.
- Students must be regular and punctual in attending classes.
- Smoking and chewing of tobacco is strictly prohibited inside the college campus
- Cleanliness of college campus should be maintained at all cost.
- Unruly and odd behaviour in and around college campus will be dealt with seriously.
